

# Of 1858 Texas Kitchen

A family of artists, the Ray Whipples of New Braunfels and their two sons, were to be recipients of one of the 10 annual awards to be presented by the San Antonio Conservation Society at the old Ursuline Academy Wednesday.

The Whipples' award is for their adaptive use of an early Texas kitchen at the Square Nail Art Gallery.

Among these receiving the 10 awards will be Lt. Ben Barnes, accepting for the State of Texas, cited for preserving Indian pictographs in Val Verde County.

Others are Ernst Riemer, craftsman award for iron work at the Ursuline Academy and Church of the Little Flower; Curtis Tunnel, state archeologist, for work for the Texas Historical Survey Committee; Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bybee for their projects at Round Top; and Harry Jersig for a log cabin restoration on his ranch.

Recipients also include Dr. R. O. Monsalvo for adaptive use of an old stone home as law offices; Mrs. Youngs Crook for her history, "San Pedro Springs Park;" Lewis Fisher for articles on San Antonio heritage; and John Spice for incorporating the window of the MKT station in the building of Los Patios and natural treatment of landscaping at Los Patios and Salado Creek.

The old kitchen belonged to the residence built in 1858 by Andreas Breustedt at what is now Highway 46 East and the IH 35 access road. The house was moved in 1958 to make way for a service station.

Originally, the stone kitchen was a separate building, later attached to the main house by a porch. Huge hand-hewn limestone blocks pave the kitchen floor where the stove stood, the rest is floored in wide board.

The building now houses a studio and the shop of the Square Nail Gallery.

Works of painter Whipple and his wife Peg are known nationally. Her plaques of

weathered wood and ceramic are used by noted decorators throughout the nation.

Ray Whipple headed the art department of a national advertising agency before devoting his time entirely to fine arts. Their sons, Raymond and Bill, are distinguishing themselves as painters.

Raymond now is a partner in Poor Richard's Gallery, Canyon Road, Santa Fe, N.M., with Doc and Lillian Ewen. He has been here recently en route to Nicaragua for a vacation.

The collection of paintings by Santa Fe artists now hanging in the Square Nail Gallery in-

cludes mountain scenes of Rod Goebel, whose works have been rated one of the best investments in art for 1971.

Others in the collection are by Hal Hermanson, Paul Wilson, Don Miller, Paul Kinslow, Frank Kuziel, and Dane Clark, director of the Colorado Institute of Art, Denver.

These are some of the finest of Santa Fe artists, Whipple said.

Works of ceramist Betty LeBow of Santa Fe are in the shop.

The gallery and shop are open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. six days a week, closed Tuesday.

## City Employees' Insurance Premium Costs Increased

The City Council heard a report on the increase in hospitalization insurance premiums for city employees at the Monday night meeting.

Due to the rising costs in hospitalization, the insurance company has raised the cost of the insurance premiums \$1.58 per month for employees, to be paid by the city, and \$3.02 for dependents, to be paid by the employee. The raise in costs will take effect April 1 of this year.

The present policy covering city employees does not expire until Feb. 1, 1972. This is the third year the policy has been in effect.

The council also voted to accept bids on a riding mower and a cash register for the Landa Park Golf Course.

The mower will cost \$3,000 plus \$195 for a spare reel. The bid was the lowest of two received on the mower, coming from Goldthwaites of Texas, Inc. The other bid was received from Watson Distributing Co. for \$3,089 plus \$374 for the spare reels. Both firms are in San Antonio.

Dean Office Supply of New Braunfels was awarded contract for the cash register, with a low bid of \$880.50 for a new machine. There were three bids received on the register, with National Cash Register bidding \$1,085 for a new machine and \$798 for a rebuilt. Cash Register

In other action, the council: Approved the third and final reading of an ordinance amending an ordinance to rezone the W.H. Dillon and the R. G. Krause property to allow the installation of an antique shop.

Authorized the city manager to deposit \$5,300 of a certificate of deposit into a checking account and put the remaining funds, \$11,700, back into a certificate of deposit.

Approved an application by Louis Basurco of San Antonio for a general contractor's license for the purpose of installing a fence.

## Taken in Burglary

Theft of beer, gum, and snacks was reported to the Comal County Sheriff's office Monday.

El Ranchito, located five miles southwest of New Braunfels on FM 482, was broken into sometime during Friday night or early Saturday morning.

Entry was gained by kicking two sections of the back door out and taking the board off from behind the door. The thieves left by the same route.

Taken were eight cases of beer, valued at \$28.60, two boxes of gum, valued at \$2.40, and dried beef and hot sausage, worth \$3. The damage to the door was set at \$10, according to the sheriff's office report.
